6	Evaluation (High)	Do you think the Church's involvement in the Magna Carta helped or harmed its long-term role in English politics? Explain.	Answers will vary but should include reasoning. Example: It helped because it secured the Church's rights in law and reinforced its influence. However, others might argue it tied the Church too closely to political disputes.
